



















# Knowledge Core Subject Knowledge Organiser

<b>Sikhism</b>	 Guru Nanak and the 9 other Gurus who shared the initial teachings.	 Gurdwara	Guru Granth Sahib	 Granthi	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Sikhism stresses the importance of doing good actions rather than merely carrying out rituals.</li> <li>Sikhs show their belief by demonstrating the 5K's.</li> <li>The community of Sikhs is called 'The Khalsa'</li> </ul>
